Planar Maximum Efficiency General Application (MEGA) Schottky barrier rectifier with an integrated guard ring for stress protection, encapsulated in a SOD123W small and flat lead Surface-Mounted Device (SMD) plastic package.

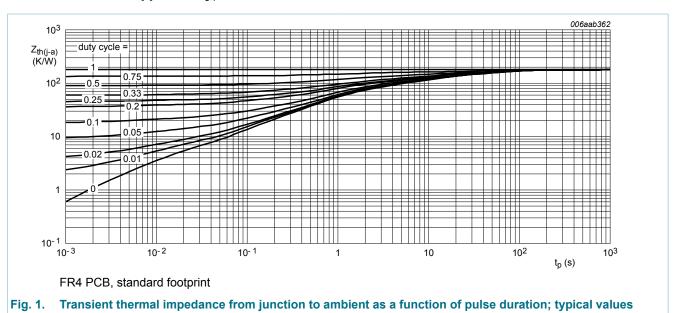

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High-temperature 40 V, 1 A Schottky barrier rectifier

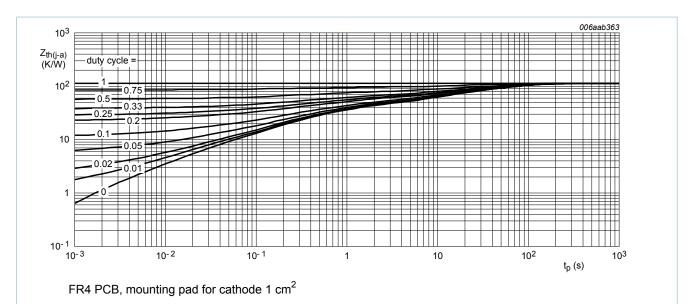


Fig. 2. Transient thermal impedance from junction to ambient as a function of pulse duration; typical values

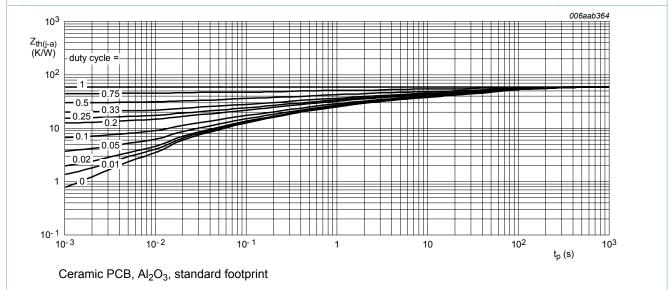


Fig. 3. Transient thermal impedance from junction to ambient as a function of pulse duration; typical values

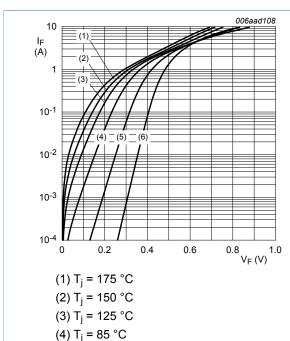
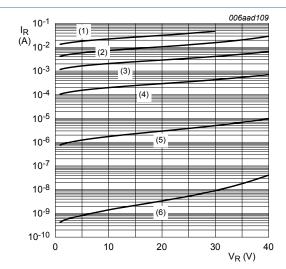


Fig. 4. Forward current as a function of forward voltage; typical values

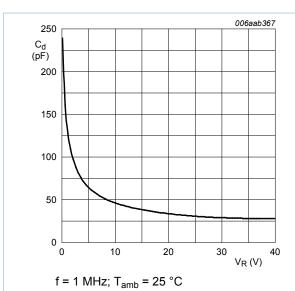
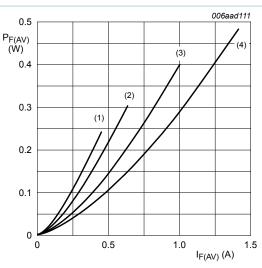


Fig. 6. Diode capacitance as a function of reverse voltage; typical values



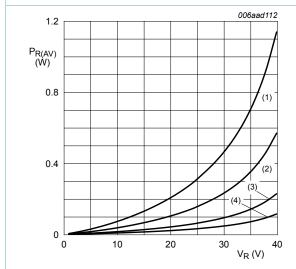

Fig. 7. Average forward power dissipation as a function of average forward current; typical values



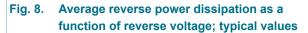

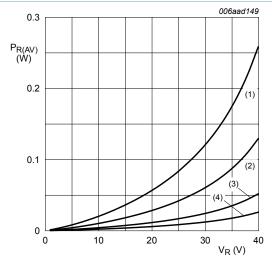

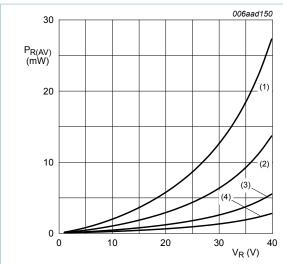

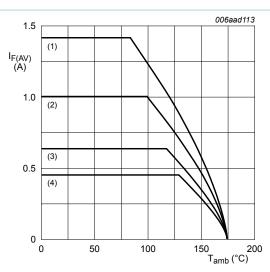

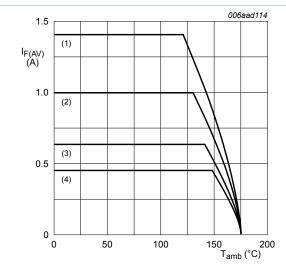

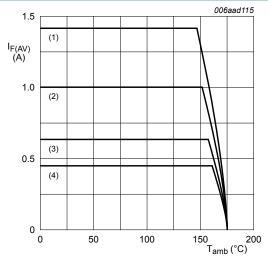

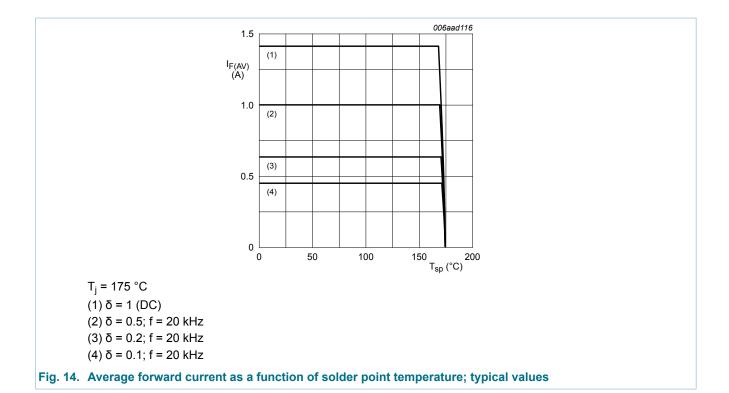

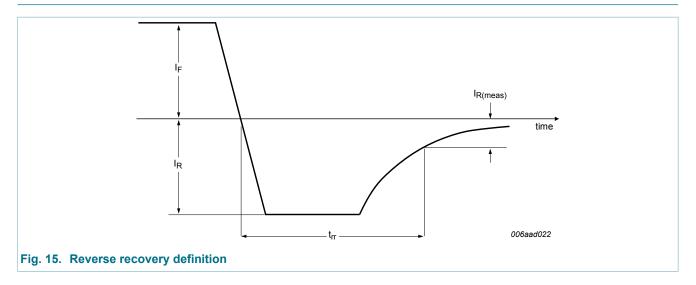

Fig. 13. Average forward current as a function of ambient temperature; typical values

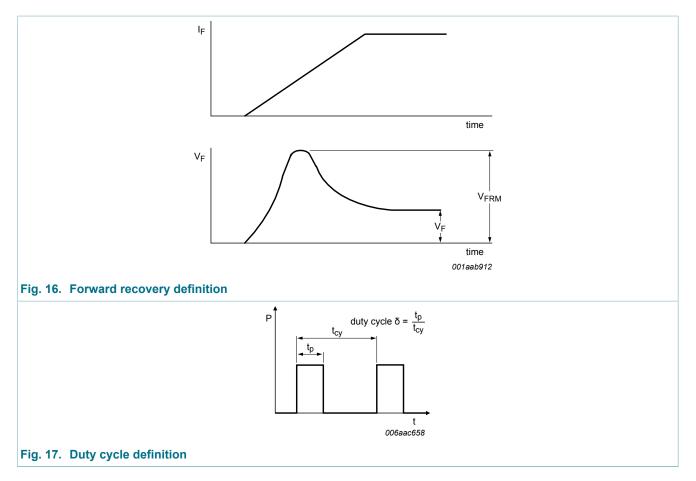

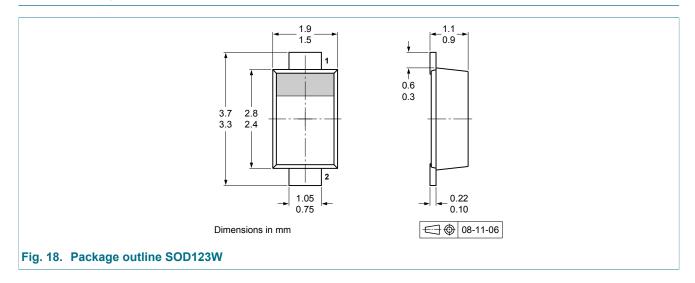

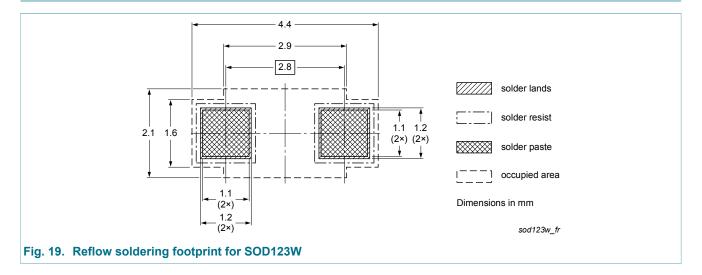
